The Second Sunday of Easter – Divine Mercy Sunday

In 1931, a sister of the Congregation of Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy, Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938) is said to have been personally visited by Jesus. According to her diary, an image was revealed to her of the risen Lord, from whose heart shone two rays, one red (representing blood) and the other "pale" (symbolizing water), with the words "Jesus, I trust in you" at the bottom. Faustina wrote in her diary that Jesus told her, "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish." When she was canonized in 2000 under the direction of Pope John Paul II, he proclaimed that the Second Sunday of Easter would henceforth be known as Divine Mercy Sunday. The celebration of Divine Mercy Sunday is an opportunity to reflect on the theme of how God's mercy can overcome sin. Among the practices associated with the devotion are its novena, the Chaplet of the Divine Mercy, the Hour of Great Mercy and the plenary indulgence granted to those who receive the Eucharist and celebrate reconciliation on Divine Mercy Sunday.

Divine Mercy Prayer

***Eternal God
in whom mercy is endless
and the treasury of compassion
inexhaustible,
look kindly upon us
and increase Your mercy in us,
that in difficult moments
we might not despair
nor become despondent,
but with great confidence
submit ourselves to Your holy will,
which is Love and Mercy itself.***

Amen.**Something to ponder in the Year of Mercy –**

This Year of Mercy represents an excellent opportunity to thank God for His Love and Mercy.

God is merciful to those who want His mercy. However, He does not force Himself on us. We have the freedom to choose by the way we live our lives. We are wise to remember that God does not owe us forgiveness, redemption, or anything else. Nor does God's mercy license us to continue in sin. It demands a response to "go, and sin no more." To borrow a thought from Augustine: ***We must not despair, one of the thieves was saved; we must not presume, one of the thieves was damned.***

The following is an excerpt from the book "Evangelizing Catholics" by Scott Hahn.

[According to Pope Benedict XVI,] **"Success is not one of the names of God."** If we measured the value of what Jesus did on earth by the number of people who came to believe in Him during His lifetime, we would all be in trouble.

Again, fidelity is what God wants from us. He wants us to live the Gospel, and He wants us to proclaim it. He wants us to love Him, and He wants us to lead others to His love.

How each of us does that will be different from how everybody else does that. In his introduction to Rome Sweet Home, Peter Kreeft says that **conversions are like snowflakes: no two are alike.** The same can be said about the forms the work of the New Evangelization will take in each of our lives. The work will look different in every home and every parish. How we go about that work is a question for prayer and discernment.

But we do need to go about it. **"Enter by the narrow gate," Jesus tells us. "For the gate is wide and the way is easy, that leads to destruction, and those who enter by it are many. For the gate is narrow and the way is hard, that leads to life, and those who find it are few" (Mt 7:13-14).**

That's Jesus' take on the road to heaven: the gate is narrow and those who find it are few. Our culture's take (a take shared by many Catholics, faithful or otherwise) is just the opposite: the gate to heaven is wide, and those who find it are many.

Nobody knows how many souls are in heaven and how many souls are in hell. That's like asking how many angels can dance on the head of a pin. But, if I'm playing the odds, I'm going with Jesus on this one. **Heaven is not guaranteed.** It's not a sure thing – not for anyone, and especially not for those following the wide, sloping path paved by our culture.
