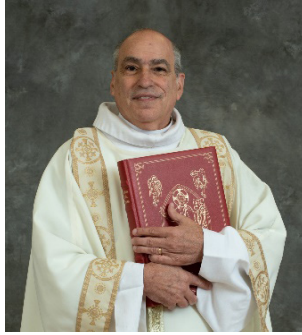

From the Deacon's Desk*Dear friends in Christ,*

There is something about news, both good news and bad news. The most-watched programs on television are news programs. Even though it can be repetitious and depressing, people want to keep up with the latest news. And if we have news of our own, we want to share it. You must tell someone: news begs to be passed on. No doubt, it is terrible when the news is bad. The heart sinks when we hear bad news. But when the news is good it is so different. In my experience, there is nothing quite like the joy of telling someone that a baby has been born.

Each year, the Gospel passage for the **Fourth Sunday of Advent** is the story of **Mary's** pregnancy. **Mary** was bursting with news, and it was about the birth of a baby. She couldn't keep it to herself: no sooner did the angel bring her the good news of great joy than she set out to share it with her kinswoman, **Elizabeth**. The **two women** share their **news** and their **faith** together.

This is how the **Church** began, how the **Gospel** was first preached and how it spread throughout the world. This news of a pregnancy has been told repeatedly for centuries. Over the centuries, people couldn't keep it to themselves: good news needed to be shared. In our modern day there are lots of ways to do it: sending **Christmas** cards of the Nativity rather than reindeers, snow bunnies, and robins; having Nativity plays; inviting someone to come with you to **Christmas Mass**. Through such simple ways people can come to recognize that what we are celebrating is the birth of **Jesus, the Savior of the world, and the faith of His mother, Mary.**

Saint John the Baptist, pray for us.

The remaining days of **December** mark the beginning of the **Christmas** season. The liturgical color changes to white or gold – a symbol of joy, purity, and innocence. The month of **December** is also dedicated to the **Immaculate Conception**.

Fourth Sunday of Advent: Today, the **Church** celebrates the **Fourth Sunday of Advent**. We light the last candle on our **Advent** wreath and our preparation for **Christmas** is almost finished. We also reach the culmination of the **O Antiphons**. In previous antiphons, our cry was directed to the **Messiah** as **He** manifested **Himself** to the **Chosen People**, to the **Gentiles**, and in nature; now **He** is addressed in person and asked to remain with us as **Emmanuel**.



The Beauty of the Advent Wreath: The **Advent Wreath** is a long-standing **Christmas** tradition, adding beauty and light to the season. The wreath is a circle, without beginning or end, symbolizing our participation in **God's** plan of salvation, and our hope to share eternal life in the **Kingdom of Heaven**. The traditional wreath is made from fresh, natural materials, because **Christ** came to give us new life through **His** Passion, death, and **Resurrection**. There are **three** purple or white candles, symbolizing penance, preparation, and sacrifice. The **pink** or rose-colored candle highlights the **Third Sunday of Advent (Gaudete Sunday)**, when we rejoice because our preparation is now halfway finished. The light itself represents **Christ**. The progression of lighting candles shows our increasing readiness to meet our **Lord**.

Rejoice: The Lord is Nigh: As **Christmas** draws near, the **Church** emphasizes the joy which should be in our hearts over all that the birth of our **Savior** means for us. The immense joy of **Christians** is to see the day drawing nigh when the **Lord** will come again in **His** glory to lead them into **His** kingdom.

Your place on the tree

Family trees are an endless source of fascination. Whether you've explored yours through DNA tests or old photo albums and family stories, you know that a ragtag line of other people's chances and choices contribute to who you are. The Advent Jesse Tree teaches children about many risk-takers and seekers throughout biblical history who contributed to the arrival of Jesus. Folks like Jesse himself, the father of David who contributed to the lineage of the kings of Israel and, without suspecting it, the future King of the Universe. What might your legacy be, and how do you claim your place in the great story?

TODAY'S READINGS: Micah 5:1-4a; Hebrews 10:5-10; Luke 1:39-45 (12). *"Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb."*

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O KEY OF DAVID)

He's on his way

Today's Great Antiphon—the fourth of seven ancient prayers said during Advent vespers leading up to Christmas Eve—is "O Key of David, come and free us!" Each Antiphon is a call to Christ using a messianic title from prophecy, and today's reminds us that we are captives liberated by God's grace. The answer to our cries is embedded in the titles themselves. The seven titles in Latin—*Sapientia, Adonai, Radix Jesse, Clavis David, Oriens, Rex Gentium, and Emmanuel*—in reverse order form the acrostic ERO CRAS, which means "I am coming soon."

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 7:10-14; Luke 1:26-38 (196). *"The Lord God will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever."*

MEMORIAL OF PETER CANISIUS, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH (O RADIANT DAWN)

Let the light shine

The Protestant Reformation was an age of strife and contestation, especially in Germany, ground zero of the upheaval in 1517. Into the morass stepped a learned Jesuit scholar, amazing preacher, and gifted writer—Peter Canisius, whose rational arguments in support of Catholicism proved quite persuasive. Peter's three written catechisms were so effective, German-born Pope Benedict XVI told a papal audience in 2011, that later generations of Germans simply referred to them as "the Canisius." On what's the longest night of the year for many, tap the faith of Peter Canisius to reflect upon the ways that Jesus is our Radiant Dawn.

TODAY'S READINGS: Song of Songs 2:8-14 or Zephaniah 3:14-18a; Luke 1:39-45 (197). *"Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled."*

Wednesday, Dec 22, 2021

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O KING OF ALL NATIONS)

God of surprises

God acts in ways we least expect. The long-awaited Messiah was expected to be a military leader who would lead his people, Israel, to victory and out of oppression. Instead, he was born in a stable to a young woman of the village and a carpenter who would be his foster father. Today that young woman makes a bold proclamation, "He has thrown down the rulers from their thrones

but lifted up the lowly." As we come closer to Christmas, ask God to help you look for him in the unexpected so that he might refashion you. After all, history is full of unexpected saints—why not you?

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 Samuel 1:24-28; Luke 1:46-56 (198). *"[God] has looked upon his lowly servant. From this day all generations will call me blessed."*

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O EMMANUEL)

Hear our plea

What is more poignant than an expression of heartfelt longing? Today anyone taking part in the longstanding tradition of Evening Prayer, or vespers, sings, "O Emmanuel, come to redeem us!" It's a plea of yearning. For centuries on this day near Christmas, Catholics have opened their hearts and prayed for a savior. Let this vulnerable prayer of hope and desire for all that Christmas represents—light, life, salvation—be a kind of mantra as you go about your day.

TODAY'S READINGS: Malachi 3:1-4, 23-24; Luke 1:57-66 (199). *"When the time arrived for Elizabeth to have her child she gave birth to a son."*

Thanksgiving on Christmas Eve

For many Catholics, Christmas Eve is brimming with meal preparation, cleaning, wrapping last-minute stocking stuffers, and Midnight Mass. It can also be a difficult day for those missing loved ones. In whatever situation you find yourself, take a moment and join the church in praying the Canticle of Zechariah, also known as the Benedictus. As he awaited the birth of his son John (later known as the Baptist), Zechariah sang a canticle of gratitude to God for setting us free from all that binds. May this prayer bring freedom and joy to us all!

TODAY'S READINGS: Morning: 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16; Luke 1:67-79 (200). *"In the tender compassion of our God the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness."*

SOLEMNITY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE LORD (CHRISTMAS)

The weary world rejoices

The efforts of people of goodwill everywhere in the quest for peace and justice continue, and our leader is born anew today! Spiritual author and priest Henri Nouwen put it well: "The world is not whole. . . . But it is into this broken world that a child is born, who is called Son of the Most High, Prince of Peace, Savior. I look at him and pray, 'Thank you, Lord, that you came. . . . Your heart is greater than mine.'" Our hope and our hearts increase today. Rejoice!
