Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

With the last Monday celebration of the Baptism of Our Lord Jesus Christ, we ended the liturgical season called Christmas Time, and entered a new liturgical season called Ordinary Time.

The 34 weeks of Ordinary Time contain the rest of Jesus' earthly ministry and some of the major events of the Gospel we have come to know and love.

The miracles, the parables, the calling of the Twelve, the Sermon on the Mount, the Bread of Life Discourse. . . we get all that and more during this season. Truly, there is much to celebrate.

The term "ordinary" in our common use typically refers to something being plain, unimpressive, or unexciting. A sense of "it is what it is" mentality. For that reason, many people hear "Ordinary Time," and they immediately think of the season as such. But that understanding doesn't reflect the true meaning of the season.

Ordinary, in this context, comes from the Latin term ordinarius, meaning "numbered" or "ruled." This title simply refers to the ongoing and rhythmical nature of the season. Just like everyday life, there is a rhythm to the days and the weeks. Sure, we have holidays and special occasions that we look forward to that change the pace, just like we have holy days and feasts in the Church year. But those special occasions aren't the whole picture, just like there is more to the life of **Christ** than what we celebrate in other liturgical seasons.

The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green. This is to represent the time of growth and expansion of the Church following the life, death, and Resurrection of Jesus, Green is a very natural color and is often a symbol for growth and new life.

Like all Liturgical Seasons, Ordinary Time is meant to be lived! We aren't passive receptors of the liturgy - or at least we shouldn't be. We are called to be active participants! Participating in Ordinary Time means participating in the everyday life of Jesus.

According to the USCCB, "The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ. Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of **Christ** is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ."

Think about that last phrase for a moment. Keep smiling, be positive, God loves us.

Today's Gospel: The Gospel is from St. John 1:29-34. John the Baptist identified Jesus as "The Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world" (Jn 1:29). Anticipating Jesus' messianic and salvific role, each of the four evangelists start their Gospels with the **Baptist's** words. The **Lamb** refers to the idea of salvation. The Lamb is the gift of liberation that, following the flight from Egypt, the Israelites sacrificed to the Lord. St. John the Baptist witnesses, his testimony is centralized on Christ. John indicates the presence of the Lord and then steps into the margins. "I am not the Christ" and he goes on to affirm "I am the one who has been sent to go in front of him." "It is the bridegroom who has the bride; and yet the bridegroom's friend, who stands there and listens to him, is filled with joy at the bridegroom's voice. This is the joy I feel, and it is complete. He must grow greater, I must grow less."(Jn 3:28-30) Today's Gospel offers us an eloquent example to imitate, so that we can also become Christ's authoritative witnesses. A believer can only give an authoritative witness if it coexists in perfect harmony with the Baptist's evangelical qualities.

"Let us do as Jesus did: let us share, let us carry each other's burdens, let us look at each other with compassion, let us help each other. Let us ask ourselves: Am I a person who divides or shares?"

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<u>Prayer:</u> Almighty ever-living God, who govern all things, both in heaven and on earth, mercifully hear the pleading of Your people and bestow Your peace on our times. Through Our Lord Jesus Christ, Your Son, Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen

The Apophthegmata Patrum is a 1,600-year-old collection of writings known as the Sayings of the Desert Fathers. These texts record the teachings of the earliest Christian monks, who congregated in the desert of Egypt. The wisest among these monks was Anthony the Abbot. He wrote: "Just as fish die if they stay too long out of water, so the monks who loiter outside their cells or pass their time with men of the world lose the intensity of inner peace." When Christianity became politically accepted—and martyrdoms ceased—Anthony sought the desert to experience a different kind of sacrifice. There he found silence and solitude, too. Seek God in silence today.

Twelve is enough

Twelve months of the year. Twelve inches in a foot. Twelve numbers on the face of a watch. We certainly like our twelves. So does the church. The most famous of course is the 12 apostles, often simply called the Twelve. There's also the 12 days of Christmas and 12 fruits of the Holy Spirit. It's not just that 12 is a handy number for grouping things, it also carries symbolic value. It signifies completion or fullness. Twelve eggs, for example, means you have a full carton. And 12 apostles means the church has everything it needs to preach the Good News. Count your spiritual blessings—by the dozen!

TODAY'S READINGS: Hebrews 8:6-13; Mark 3:13-19 (315). "He appointed Twelve, whom he also named Apostles."

Saturday, Jan 21, 2023

No has always meant no

As a young girl of 13 or 14, Agnes refused all suitors because she had betrothed herself to Christ. As punishment, she was taken to a brothel. One man attempted to violate her, only to be mysteriously struck blind—until Agnes restored his sight. Historical or not, this story reminds us that the scandal of child sex trafficking has always been, and still is, very much with us. Millions of girls and boys are kidnapped, bought and sold, exploited and violated for profit every year. 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
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
