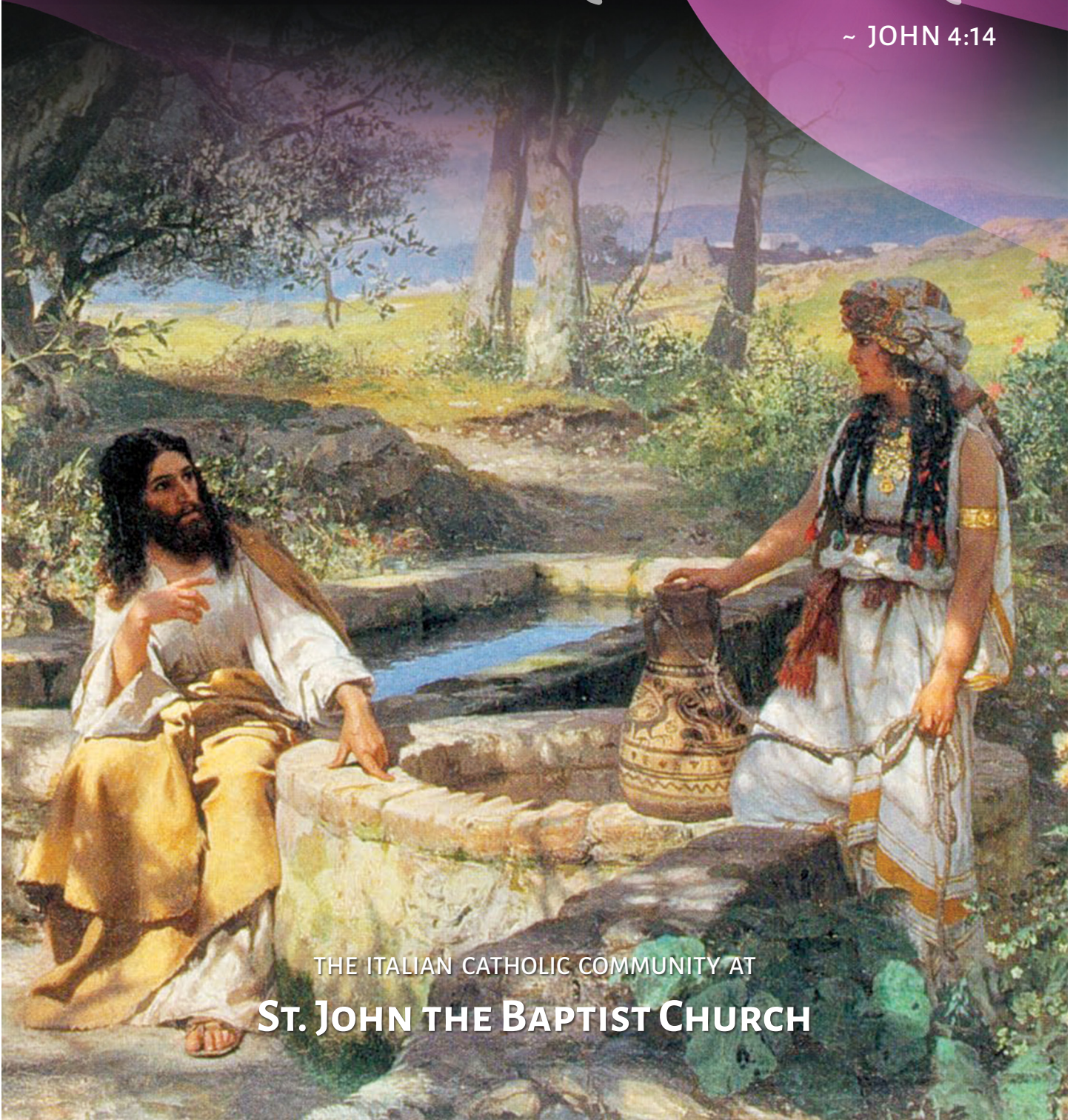

AROUND US

The Holy Father's Intentions for the Month of March 2023: *We pray for those who have suffered harm from members of the Church; may they find within the Church herself a concrete response to their pain and suffering.*

Liturgical Calendar: The entire month of **March** falls during the liturgical season of **Lent** which is represented by the liturgical color violet or purple — a symbol of penance, mortification and the sorrow of a contrite heart. All saint days that are usually **Memorials** are shifted to **Optional Memorials** during the season of **Lent**.

The Josephinum Come and See: Young men (high school juniors and seniors and college-aged) are encouraged to consider attending the next **Come and See Weekend at the Josephinum, March 16-19**. If you have a young man interested in attending, please email the **Vocations Office – vocations@columbuscatholic.org** or call 614-221-5565, and we will help get him registered.

CRS Rice Bowl is a **Lenten** faith formation program for use in parishes, schools, religious education programs and by families and individuals in the home. This year's **CRS Rice Bowl** donations are critical for these grants to continue as the fund's account is nearly depleted. Please support **CRS Rice Bowl during Lent**. **Bowls are located on the tables at the entrance to the Church.**

Church Regulations Regarding Fasting and Abstinence during Lent: This obligation prohibits the eating of meat, but not eggs, milk products or condiments of any kind, even though made from animal fat. The law of fasting on **Ash Wednesday** and **Good Friday** applies to all **Catholics from age 18 through age 59**. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. Those who are ill or pregnant may be dispensed from their obligation.

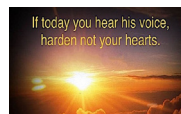
Highlights of the Month: As we continue our **Lenten** journey, **three** prominent ideas are proposed for our contemplation by the liturgy of Lent: **The Passion and Resurrection of Christ, baptism, and penance**. The **Solemnity of St. Joseph (March 20)** is a special landmark this month in which we will celebrate the great honor bestowed upon the foster father of **Jesus**. Also, the **Solemnity of the Annunciation (March 25)** is when we ponder **Our Lady's fiat**. And **St. Patrick's feast** is another cause for a joyful celebration.

Lenten Practices: Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are the three pillars of **Lenten** practices. **Prayer** is our necessary communication with **God**, reminding us of our very intimate relationship with **God**, our creator. **Fasting** can help us curb our body's appetites and put our soul in control. **Fasting** does not have to be limited to avoiding food. We can also fast from different forms of entertainment and our over-reliance on the smartphone. **Lent** can be an opportunity to give up these forms of escape and replace them with some good spiritual reading. **Almsgiving** is the third pillar. When we give alms, we are reminded that the monetary resources that we have are ultimately the result of **God's** blessings which are meant to be shared, especially with the poor. ~ **Father Kitzmiller**

Dispensation for Saint Patrick's Day: The obligation to abstain from meat on the **Fridays of Lent** is an important element of the **Church's** observance of the penitential nature of this holy season. This year, **March 17, the Friday of the Third Week of Lent**, corresponds with **Saint Patrick's Day**, traditionally an occasion for joy-filled celebrations in this diocese, especially among those of **Irish** heritage. **Bishop Fernandes**, taking into consideration both past practice and present circumstances, has granted to the faithful of the **Diocese of Columbus**, as well as to any visitors or travelers who may be physically present within the territory of this diocese, a dispensation from the obligation of abstinence from meat on **March 17, 2023**, provided that the member of the faithful taking advantage of this dispensation, undertakes one of the following works: 1) makes a pilgrimage or visit to any church in the **Diocese of Columbus** named in honor of **St. Patrick (Columbus, London, Junction City)**; 2) assists at **Mass** at any church, chapel, or oratory on **March 17th**; 3) prays the "**Breastplate of St. Patrick**," attributed to **St. Patrick**; 4) engages in some pious devotion such as the **Rosary, the Stations of the Cross, or Eucharistic Adoration**; or 5) performs an act of comparable penance (such as abstinence from meat) on some other occasion during the **Third Week of Lent**.

Today's Gospel: The **Gospel** is from **St. John 4:5-42**. This **gospel**, about the **Samaritan** woman, is exceptionally rich. Every time we read it, we are passionately moved by that intense conversation between **Jesus** and the **Samaritan** woman. The **Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI**, recalling the great teaching of **Saint Augustine**, regarding **Christ's** request to the woman, "**give me something to drink**," said: "**Yes, God thirsts for our faith and our love. As a good and merciful father, He wants our total, possible good, and this good is He Himself. The Samaritan woman, on the other hand, represents the existential dissatisfaction of one who does not find what he seeks. She had "five husbands" and now she lives with another man; her going to and from the well to draw water expresses a repetitive and resigned life. However, everything changes for her that day, thanks to the conversation with the Lord Jesus.....**" (**Benedict XVI, Angelus 24 February 2008**). To recognize that if we entrust ourselves to **God**, we receive every "possible good" which, as the **Pope** reminds us, is **God** himself, means living the dynamic of conversion to **God**: renouncing a self-centered mentality, which deceives self-sufficient man, to receive the gift of **God**. Man without **God** is inevitably destined to dissatisfaction, limited in everything by his own limits as a creature, even in "giving himself" or "obtaining for himself" joy, love, happiness... Man without **God** cannot think to reach boundless joy, unlimited and eternal love, the living water of which, precisely, **Jesus** speaks with the **Samaritan** woman.

Sunday, Mar 12, 2023**Truth be told**

Pontius Pilate famously asked Jesus, "What is truth?" Pilate didn't stick around for the answer (which in itself says a lot), but if he had, he might have heard something like the definition the Catechism of the Catholic Church provides: "Truth as uprightness in human action and speech is called truthfulness, sincerity, or candor. Truth or truthfulness is the virtue which consists in showing oneself true in deeds and truthful in words, and in guarding against duplicity, dissimulation, and hypocrisy." Now we have a sense of what it means to imitate Christ in all things.

TODAY'S READINGS: Exodus 17:3-7; Romans 5:1-2, 5-8; John 4:5-42 (28). *"God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and truth."*

Monday, Mar 13, 2023**On the frontiers of servanthood**

When you think of the legendary figures of the Wild West, Billy the Kid, Buffalo Bill, Annie Oakley, Geronimo, and Sitting Bull come to mind. But how about Sister Blandina Segale? Add her to list—because she had encounters with many of those men and women, and her life was also the stuff of lore. Born in 1850, this Italian-American Sister of Charity of Cincinnati traveled alone through the American frontier to serve the poor and sick (including saving the life of a seriously wounded Billy the Kid), to advocate for Native American civil rights, and to fight against lynching (including protecting a contrite murderer from a mob). This Catholic Sisters Week (March 8-14) count Segale, honored by the church with the title servant of God, among the heroic sisters who have your gratitude for spreading the faith.

Tuesday, Mar 14, 2023**No room for hate**

Fannie Lou Hamer died this day in 1977. But she nearly died in 1963, in a Mississippi jail cell—so badly beaten, as a civil rights advocate, that her cell mate didn't think she'd survive the night. But Hamer asked her to join in singing the hymn "Walk With Me, Lord" and lived to see another day. In fact Hamer lived to testify, on television, before the 1964 Democratic National Convention. A tireless campaigner for women's voting rights, she was also inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame. Follow Hamer's lead in fostering forgiveness: "I feel sorry for anybody that could let hate wrap them up. Ain't no such thing as I can hate anybody and hope to see God's face."

TODAY'S READINGS: Daniel 3:25, 34-43; Matthew 18:21-35 (238). *"Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him?"*

Wednesday, Mar 15, 2023**Printing the truth is worth the struggle**

On this week in 1827, *Freedom's Journal* began publication as the first African-American newspaper in history. Founded by Protestant minister John Wilk and leading free black men in New York City, the paper would set off a revolution in U.S. media, resulting in similar papers being established nationwide, forming the black press. Daniel Rudd founded the first black Catholic

newspaper in 1885, and the explosion in African-American conversions to Catholicism in the 20th century can be attributed in large part to these newspapers advertising better conditions in the northern United States (where Catholic parishes and schools happened to be plentiful). The black press continues today in many American cities and represents one of the nation's original justice-focused professional institutions. Consider supporting a local—or national—black news outlet today.

Thursday, Mar 16, 2023**Let God carry it**

The comedy-drama *The Banshees of Inisherin* features a man gloomy about his eventual death going to Confession over a period of weeks. Each time, the priest asks, "And how is the despair?" implying despair itself might be seen as a sin—rather tough but also tender in the way the priest wants to understand the whole man. The church upholds hope as a virtue and warns against despair because it can leave no room for God's grace. That said, our faith leaders have long shown compassion for the complexities of depression in its many forms. Whatever your emotional state, consider turning today's burdens over to God.

TODAY'S READINGS: Jeremiah 7:23-28; Luke 11:14-23 (240). *"But if it is by the finger of God that I drive out demons, then the Kingdom of God has come upon you."*

Friday, Mar 17, 2023**As luck would have it**

The Lord expects great things from us: namely, to love God with our whole heart, soul, and mind, and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Are humans really capable of such love? Irish writer Oscar Wilde had his doubts: "I sometimes think that God in creating man somewhat overestimated his ability." We human beings do tend to make a mess of things when left to our own devices, but luckily for us, we have a loving God who sent Jesus to show us the way to love, and the Holy Spirit to keep us on the path of love. In honor of Saint Patrick, remember to draw on the Trinity as you continually recalibrate your trajectory toward love.

Saturday, Mar 18, 2023**The fragrance of forgiveness**

Cyril, a fourth-century bishop of Jerusalem and a doctor of the church, was instrumental in forming the church's doctrinal understanding of the Holy Spirit. He wrote, "The Spirit comes gently and makes himself known by his fragrance. He is not felt as a burden for God is light . . . The Spirit comes with the tenderness of a true friend to save, to heal, to teach, to counsel, to strengthen and to console." The formula for absolution in the sacrament of Reconciliation identifies the Holy Spirit as sent "for the forgiveness of sins." Celebrate the sacrament at your church this afternoon.
